


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

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REPORT of JOHN HENRY CAPPER, Esq. Superintendent of Ships and Vessels  
employed for the Confinement of Offenders under Sentence of Transporta-  
tion ;—dated 30 July 1835.

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MY LORD,

Lambeth Terrace, 30 July 1835.

I HAVE the honour of reporting to your Lordship upon the state of the respec-  
tive Convict Hulks stationed at Woolwich, Chatham and Portsmouth, also  
those at Bermuda, and of the behaviour of the Prisoners and conduct of the  
Officers belonging to those Hulks.

The Prisoners have conducted themselves orderly since my former Report, and  
have, in the execution of their various occupations when on shore at labour, given  
satisfaction to the Officers of the Naval and Ordnance Departments under whom  
they have been employed.

Every attention has been given to comply with the Regulations for preventing  
intercourse between the Convicts and free persons ; but some irregularities in that  
respect have occasionally taken place, notwithstanding the most attentive watch-  
fulness on the part of the guards placed over the Prisoners on shore ; these depar-  
tures from the line of regulation laid down have not, however, been of any serious  
nature, and every such case, on detection, has invariably been visited with a pro-  
portionate degree of punishment.

The Establishment is gradually in a course of reduction, and before the close of  
the present year, in furtherance of former orders, and the recommendation of the  
Committee of the House of Lords, the Boys confined in the Euryalus Hulk, will  
in a great measure be disposed of by actual Transportation ; and when a suitable  
building can be procured for receiving the remainder who may be under 12 years  
of age, the establishment of that Hulk will be abolished altogether.

Calculating upon the present state of transportable offenders, and the shipments  
which are taking place at this time, I trust that in fulfilment of the measures pro-  
posed to be adopted some time since, with regard to Transportation, and reduction  
of the Establishment at home, I shall be enabled by the spring of next year, to  
reduce, if not wholly break up, the establishment of another Convict Hulk,  
employed for the confinement of adult Prisoners.

The Convicts have been healthy during the last six months, but the state in  
which many Prisoners are brought to the Hulks, with impaired constitutions, and  
the germs of organic disease, leave a vast number on board wholly unfit to undergo  
their sentences, by actual Transportation to the Australian Settlements.

The Officers throughout the service have been attentive to their respective  
duties.

I have recently received a Report from Sir Thomas Ussher, the Naval Com-  
mander of the Dock-yard at Bermuda, who states that " the Prisoners have con-  
stantly conducted themselves in a very satisfactory manner, and the Officers deserve

to be mentioned for their uniform good conduct and attention to the Prisoners;" that "the Bishop of Nova Scotia, who is now on a visit to that part of his diocese, addressed the Convicts, and expressed himself so well pleased with their respectful and attentive deportment, that his Lordship proposes preaching a sermon in each of the Hulks on Sunday next."

The Chaplains' Reports I have the honour to enclose, and also an account of the Expense of each Place of Confinement in England, from the 1st January to the 30th June last; also an average Estimate of the Prisoners' Earnings for that period, the average Number of Convicts daily on board the respective Hulks, and the Number of Days' Labour performed.

I also enclose a similar account of the Expense of the Convict Hulks at Bermuda, and the Estimate of the Prisoners' Earnings, from the 1st of July to the 31st December 1834.

SIR, Portsea, 1 July 1835.  
THE Rules by which the Hulks are regulated continue to be enforced with firmness, and in consequence a good state of discipline prevails on board. The Convicts in general are quiet and orderly in their Wards, and attentive at Divine Service.

The chief offences against discipline consist only of the detection of individuals with a little tobacco in their possession, which is strictly forbidden by the present Regulations. It thus appears that this privation is felt by the majority of the Convicts to be the severest that has been inflicted upon them.

SIR, Fortitude Convict Hulk, 6 July 1835.  
IN laying before you a statement of the conduct of the Prisoners at this Hulk, I have to observe that they continue to demean themselves in strict accordance with the Rules and Regulations of the service (except in few instances); and though many of them have not been accustomed to hard labour, yet they are brought to exert themselves so as to become efficient workmen.

It also may be expected of me to give a more particular statement with regard to my own ministration among them, and its results; allow me then to observe that we have regularly, as you know, Divine Service twice every Lord's Day, and on one evening in the week; and I am happy to say that there is very seldom any reason to complain of inattention on the part of the Convicts; my communication with the sick also enables me to state that several instances have come under my observation of a satisfactory character, as to moral and religious benefit; and I trust that the idle habits and religious ignorance to which the dishonest practices of the Convicts may to a great extent be traced, are in a considerable measure removed by their detention at this Hulk.

SIR, Euryalus Convict Hulk, 3 July 1835.  
IN reporting on the general state of the Juvenile Convicts on board the Euryalus, I am happy to be enabled to state that their conduct has of late been very satisfactory. There is a progressive improvement in their deportment; they are become more quiet and orderly; how far this may be attributed to the plan lately adopted of appointing wardsmen or monitors to each class, I am not able to determine.

This change for the better is observable at all times, and the system of tyrannizing over one another, which formerly prevailed, has given way to a more peaceful spirit.

I also trust that religious instruction has had its due influence in promoting their improved behaviour.

I make it a practice upon their arrival, seriously to address them publicly, in the Chapel, as to what is expected from them in their conduct; and also in their strict observance of the Rules and Regulations of the Ship. I adopt the same method before their departure for New South Wales, and in both instances it has been productive of the most beneficial effects.

I am gratified in saying their attention and behaviour during the time of Divine Service is highly praiseworthy, and becoming men in their unfortunate and degraded situation; and I can confidently affirm that many have been deeply affected under the preaching of the Word, and I trust brought truly to see "the error of their way."

REPORT of JOHN HENRY CAPPER, Esq. Superintendent of Ships and Vessels employed for the Confinement of Offenders under Sentence of Transportation;—dated 2 February 1836.

MY LORD,

London, 2 February 1836.

I HAVE the honour of reporting to your Lordship, that during the last year the Prisoners on board the several Convict Depôts in England have continued to behave orderly; the instances of irregularity having been very limited, as will appear by the Reports of the respective Chaplains, which I have the honour to enclose for your Lordship's information.

The Convicts have, in general, continued healthy; full employment has been found for them during the time of their stay in England, and the Officers placed in charge of the Prisoners have fulfilled their respective duties satisfactorily.

The Prisoners appear now to feel sensibly the effect of the Reports transmitted with them to the Hulks, from the Gaols, under the authority of the Visiting Magistrates, and which Reports are invariably forwarded to the Governors of the Australian Colonies; and, being also well aware that any deviation from the Regulations prescribed for their observance, is rigidly noted down and transmitted with them to their ultimate destination, evidently makes an impression upon them, sufficient at least, to induce them to conduct themselves with regularity during their stay in this country, as well as on their voyage to the penal settlements.

I also feel confident that the restrictions imposed upon the Governors of New South Wales and Van Diemen's Land, as to the power and time of granting pardons to Prisoners, have produced a most beneficial effect.

In reference to my former Report respecting the abolition of the Convict Hulk in which Boys under sentence of Transportation are confined, I beg leave to state that the numbers are progressively diminishing by transportation to New South Wales and Van Diemen's Land; and, as soon as Dartmoor Prison, which is now in the course of fitting, is in a state to receive Juvenile Offenders, the Euryalus Hulk, now appropriated for the reception of Convict Boys, will be immediately abolished.

At present neither of the existing Hulks used for the reception of Adult Convicts can conveniently be dispensed with; but I am in expectation that arrangements can be made in the course of the present year to abolish the Convict Hulk stationed at Chatham, as mentioned in my former Report.

I have lately received from Sir Thomas Ussher, the Captain Superintendent of the Naval Yard at Bermuda, a very satisfactory Report as to the behaviour of the Prisoners employed there upon the Naval and Ordnance Works, who have continued very healthy: the estimate of whose labour, taken at a very moderate valuation, far exceeds the expense incurred for the support of the whole establishment there. But, as I find that those Works are fast approaching to completion, I have written to Sir Thomas Ussher upon the propriety of a reduction in the establishment in that Colony, and have proposed the early abolition of one of the four Convict Hulks stationed there, which I have reason to believe can be carried into effect in the present year, as the remaining Hulks will be fully adequate to contain all the Prisoners required for completing the Works, and for the reception of any Transported Felons who may be sent to that Depôt, from Canada or the West Indies.

I have the honour to enclose an Account of the Expense of each Place of Confinement in England, between the 1st of July and the 31st December last; together with a Statement of the Prisoners' Earnings within that period; the average Number of Convicts daily on board the respective Hulks, and the Number of Days' Labour performed by such Convicts, distinguishing Artificers from Labourers. I also enclose a similar Account of the Expense of the Convict Hulks at Bermuda, and the Estimate of the Prisoners' Earnings, between the 1st of January and 30th June last.

On the 1st of January 1835, there were remaining on board the Hulks in England, 2,556 Prisoners; and during the past year, 4,063 Convicts have been received at the several Depôts, 124 of whom were from the Colonies in America and the West Indies, and the remainder from the Gaols in Great Britain. During the same period, 3,841 have been transported to New South Wales and Van Diemen's Land; 341 have been discharged; 50 removed to the Penitentiary and remanded back to Gaol; 137 have died; 8 have escaped; and 2,202 remained on board the Hulks on the 1st of January last.

Of the number received during the year, 277 prisoners were of the age of 16 years and under; 963 between that age and 20; 302 aged 20 years; and 2,521 above 20 years of age.

I HAVE no reason to vary from former statements respecting the morals and general conduct of the Convicts confined on board the Hulks in Portsmouth Harbour. They are orderly in their Wards, and the greatest decency of demeanour and apparent attention take place at Divine Service. Great contrition for their former misconduct is manifested by many, and some have exhibited very strong marks of true penitence. The sick Prisoners in the Hospital have in general expressed themselves thankful for the attentions of their Minister, and shown themselves disposed to listen to his instructions and exhortations. And I may add, that every one who has personally inspected the Hulks at this place, has invariably expressed surprise at the marked regularity and good discipline observable on board.

THE Convicts have demeaned themselves for the last six months with their usual propriety and decorum, nor has the plan adopted of sending them out of the country to a larger extent than usual had the effects which might have been anticipated of making them less submissive and orderly. My intercourse with them more especially in the Hospital, enables me to form an opinion of the effects of their confinement both in a moral and religious view, and my impression is that in several cases a real change has taken place, and that in other instances a foundation is laid for moral improvement; but in such cases much must depend on circumstances favourable to their development. There are some here on whom their confinement has no good effect, and though they may yield a reluctant submission to the Rules of the Establishment, yet it is evident that their minds are not under any salutary influence; but it is doubtful to my mind whether any human means can be instrumental in effecting a moral change to any considerable extent when the means pursued here prove nugatory.

I HAVE much satisfaction in informing you that the Boys have, upon the whole, behaved remarkably well during the last half year. A few minor offences have, doubtless, been committed, and it would be strange, constituted as human nature is, if this were not the case; but now the general good order of the Euryalus is never disturbed by any of those outbreaks of grossly bad conduct which, I am sorry to say, have, though not frequently, occurred in former times. The less

crowded state of the ship, the constant supervision of the Prisoners, the enforcement of a system of silence, and, indeed, the rigid discipline, tempered however by great kindness, which the Overseer maintains, would, I think, render a recurrence of such things extremely improbable. I believe that these Youths now very generally feel that their own comfort and happiness, while they are in confinement, are materially promoted by their good conduct, and I trust that, young as they are, they are not altogether insensible to the advantage which it will also ensure to them in after-life. I can, however, answer for their behaviour only while they are under my care.

It has often been found that the seed which has been sown in the young mind has for a considerable time lain dormant, but has at length produced the fairest fruits; and nothing can deprive me of the comfort of indulging a sanguine hope and expectation that this, through the blessing of Almighty God, will happily be realized in the experience of many of those youthful offenders who have formed a part of my spiritual charge.

I continue to address them on their first arrival at the ship, and at their departure for New South Wales, and it fails not of producing a most desirable effect. Their attention at the time of Divine Service is highly becoming.

The number on board, on the 1st of July 1835, was 453; received from that date to 31st December, 500; transported, and otherwise discharged, 468; leaving 485 on board on the 1st of the present year.

Ganymede Hulk, Woolwich, 5 Jan. 1836.

ON perusing the Report of the Evidence taken before the Lords' Committee on Goals, my attention was arrested by that portion of it given by some Prisoners who, for a short period of their sentence, were confined on board the *Ganymede Hulk*; in which Evidence the discipline of that Hulk is stated to have been of the very worst description.

I should be extremely sorry, Sir, if, in alluding to this subject, I shall be considered as having transgressed the limits of a Chaplain's duty; but I think it right to inform you that in consequence of my knowledge of their statement, I have made it my business on several occasions to visit that Hulk, as well as the *Leven*, and proceed through both decks at different hours of the evening, when I was least of all expected, and am happy to be enabled to testify that the order and decorum there maintained are equal to what the most philanthropic heart could hope, or the strictest disciplinarian look for, amongst a body of 300 men, whose minds and dispositions are so constituted as are those of the generality of Convicts.

It would indeed be a subject of joy to me, as a Christian Minister, to be able to report that some decided improvement is being effected in the moral and religious state of the old Prisoners; but experience has proved, and will, I fear, ever prove, that in the majority of cases, whatever habits of order and industry have been engendered by the strict discipline to which they are subjected, or however favourable religious appearances and professions may have been amongst some of these our unfortunate fellow-men, the principles of religion and morality have not been sufficiently established to counteract the evil of early impressions, and thereby preserve them from a repetition of the crimes induced by the depravity of their hearts.

In regard to the improvement of those whose confinement on board the Hulks in consequence of the altered system, is now limited to a few months, it cannot be expected that I should offer an opinion. It will, however, I am persuaded, be gratifying to you to learn that the practice of profane swearing amongst the new Prisoners, which I had reason to notice in my last Report, has materially decreased; that the recorded Offences for the last six months in the aggregate do not exceed 13, and that amongst these there is not one for insolence to a guard, or disobedience of orders.

I have to inform you that in all cases where parties have been summarily convicted and committed in consequence, the evidence on which the convictions were founded was always reduced to writing, but not kept, except in the four instances mentioned in the list herewith sent. William Heaps and William Robinson, the younger, were on the 15th January 1835 convicted before two justices in petty sessions, at the Town-hall in Garstang, of being, together with Samuel Isles and Jonathan Robinson, out armed at night in inclosed lands of the Duke of Hamilton, at the township of Barnacre, with bonds, in the parish of Garstang, for the destruction of game, and sent to the House of Correction at Preston for three months. It has not been usual to take the evidence in writing on which such convictions are founded, except in cases of some difficulty and importance, or where an appeal was expected to be made to the sessions, in which cases the evidence is sent along with the convictions to the clerk of the peace's office. The above Return is made on behalf of all the several clerks to magistrates acting for the division of *Staincross* aforesaid. A great many, and by far the most cases, arise in which summary convictions take place on which parties are committed, but pay the damages and costs adjudged rather than go to prison.

The following observations have been respectfully submitted to the magistrates acting for the division of *Staincross*, for their consideration :

The funds under the control of the West Riding magistrates are managed with rigid economy; no great diminution of expenditure can be expected upon the present system; the system must, therefore, be altered before any great plan of improvement can be effected in the expenditure of the county rate, which it is submitted might be done,

1st. By establishing sessions and prisons in large towns, and saving the expense of conveying and re-conveying prisoners to and from the house of correction, and to and from sessions, sometimes at considerable distances, and the expense of taking prisoners and witnesses from their businesses and homes.

2d. Without departing from the merciful presumption of law "that every man is innocent till he is proved guilty," by allowing cases of small crimes and misdemeanors not exceeding shillings, and not involving any difficult question of fact or law, and which admit of no reasonable doubt, to be tried monthly in petty sessions; and also in cases when the evidence is so clear and demonstrative, that the prisoner, having been warned, and who best knows his own case, makes his election to plead guilty upon the examination, by allowing a court of petty sessions to pass sentence instanter, and thereby saving the expenses of conveying such prisoners to and from trial, and keeping them previous to trial, and which by lessening the time of their confinement is consonant with the lenity of law.

3d. By an alteration in the bastardy law, which not only disgusts and demoralizes the country, but which adds more expense to the riding, by the delay of business it occasions at the best part of the quarter sessions, than all the orders obtained are worth, being generally from those who are not householders, and there being no power to commit to prison.

An alteration adapted to the nature of the subject and the conduct of the parties, and tending to promote the morality of the country, might probably be effected by the following enactments :

1. That child shall follow mother's settlement until it acquire one in its own right, and be maintained by her till 16; mother's liability to cease on marriage of child, if a female, and on its acquiring a settlement in its own right.

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2. That

2. That no parish relief shall be allowed to mother in respect of such child being a bastard.

3. Parish not to be burthened with birth or maintenance of bastard child; but in case of mother's inability, she may apply to magistrates in petty sessions for an order upon the putative father for its support till nine years old; money to be paid by direction of magistrates for support of child, and not for relief of mother. Order to be enforced by distress and sale of father's goods, if any, or by attachment of wages; if not any, by commitment to prison, &c.

Power to attach mother's goods and wages for maintenance of child till 16. In case of any male or female having more than two bastard children, to be liable to indictment and imprisonment, or transportation.

The gaol of Dover, which has been completed during the last year, is of a most capacious kind, and contains seven separate day-wards, with yards attached to each. It also contains 12 men's cells, capable of containing six prisoners in each; two female cells, which will hold six each; one smugglers' cell, which will hold from 12 to 20 prisoners; two debtors' rooms, which will accommodate six in each; two vagrants' cells, which will hold three prisoners in each, and six solitary cells. Annexed to the gaol are also two very large extra yards, an infirmary, chapel, and gaoler's and turnkeys' apartments.

Immediately over the the prison, the ceiling of which is supported by arches, and paved above with flag stones throughout, are a most excellent sessions-house, grand jury and other necessary rooms and town-hall, the latter of which is 130 feet long, 40 feet wide, and about 40 feet high. The whole of the premises are heated by hot water pipes.

On a recapitulation of the above it will be found that the gaol is capable of accommodating 120 prisoners. The capacity of the premises arises from the justices having recently been enabled to purchase the premises formerly occupied by the Ordnance Board at Dover, comprising the ancient tower and hospital, formerly known as the "Maison Dieu," which they have been enabled to convert to its present purposes, as before stated.

The Return from Manchester has been carefully extracted from the Books of the Police Office, which is generally known as the proper place to which such Children are to be conveyed by persons finding them in the streets, and to which Parents always resort for information if any of their Children are missing.

In this manner all that have been thus brought to the Office have been claimed, and restored to their homes.

The Township of Manchester, to which this Return relates, comprises the greater portion of the Town. In the Districts forming the Suburbs of the Town, I find that correct lists cannot be furnished; the practice having been from time to time to make Minutes as to such Children when brought to the Office, but not to file or preserve the Minutes.

The only further Return I can make is, therefore, the enclosed Return from Salford.

The number will be found to be very great, and although the Return is from a district containing an immense population, it is doubtless greater than it would otherwise be, because the nature of the employment followed by most of the Parents in the Cotton Factories prevents their attending personally to their small Children during the day, and compels them to place the charge in the hands of their older Children, or others, who are not sufficiently attentive to them.

Read the Annual Report of the Committee of Auditors up to Christmas last, and also a further Statement, being an Abstract intended for printing, both which Accounts were referred to the same Committee as was named for reporting on the Accounts generally.

The Committee appointed by the above Minutes of the Court, met on May 6, and commenced their inquiry upon the principle of considering Bridewell and Bethlem as divided into two accounts only; because that was the mode that had heretofore been the course in the Abstract annually printed for the use of the Governors, and was also the one adopted in the Abstract referred to them as examined and approved by the Committee of Auditors in April 1835.

The observations your Committee have to make on that Account are, that although it shows the transactions and expenses of the year, it does not correctly show the Balances in the hands of the Treasurer, Receiver, and Steward of Bethlem, at Christmas, because it assumes all debts due at Christmas to have been then paid though not discharged till some time afterwards, thereby making the Treasurer's Cash Balance in hand less than it really was by the amount of such debts, which in this year's account was for Bridewell, 2,818 *l.* 9 *s.* 2 *d.*, and for Bethlem, 3,024 *l.* 4 *s.* 9 *d.*; together, 5,842 *l.* 13 *s.* 11 *d.*

And also that Account includes as paid for, 3,800 *l.* consols, which were not transferred to the Trustees for the Hospital until 16 April 1835, which could not in any way be considered as a transaction of the year 1834, and which stock cost 3,505 *l.* 10 *s.*, and was not stock, but cash in the hands of the Treasurer at Christmas 1834; this entry shows a property in consols which was not there, and a consequent error in the amount of dividends to be estimated as future income.

The same irregularity with regard to charging in the Account sums as paid at Christmas, which are not paid till some time afterwards, exists also in the Accounts of the Steward of Bethlem.

Your Committee, for the reasons above stated, proceeded to work a Balance Sheet for each Hospital, which should equally at one view have the effect of showing the general transactions of the year, and the correct Cash Balances in the hands of all the accounting Officers, by commencing the Receipts with the Balances from the former year, as shown by your Ledger, and adding thereto all the sums received during the year; and on the other side, in separate columns, showing the money paid, the money due, and the total expended. These Accounts accompany this Report, and differ from the Accounts referred to the Committee, as regards the Cash Balances in the Officers' hands; viz.

It is right here to observe, that the Auditors have proceeded on Estimate, according to the customs of former years, and your Committee upon the fact as it stood debtor and creditor at Christmas 1834.

Your Committee recommend that the form of the Accounts now presented by them for the use of the Governors, be the form to be adopted in the present and future years; and that the names of the benefactors, whose monies shall have been received in the year, be inserted, with the respective sums, in the annual printed Account.

Your Committee find that the Revenue belonging to Bridewell is two distinct properties.

The one, consisting of the Royal Grant and individual Benefactions, applicable to the maintenance of the general establishment, the Chapel in the Precinct, the Chaplain, Beadles, Organist, &c., the Clerk and his officers, the Treasurer's and other Officers' residences, as well as the prisoners and vagrants in Bridewell, and the inmates and apprentices in the House of Occupation adjoining Bethlem.

The other, Locke's, Fowke's and Palmer's Bequests. The rental and dividends from Locke's being given for the special purpose of rewarding Apprentices who have served their time in the Hospital, has been some time in abeyance, the Hospital not having had Apprentices: but as the Hospital does now take Apprentices at the House of Occupation, the uses of that Fund will beneficially revive when the Apprentices shall in that establishment become entitled to the rewards that bequest may afford, and their good conduct may entitle them to. And the bequest of Palmer is applicable to the same purpose, with medicine and nurses for sick inmates. One moiety of Fowke's is for the same purpose as Locke's, and the other moiety for the cure of poor lunatics.

Your Committee also find, as by the Account presented with this Report, that the net income of 1834 was 7,053 *l.* 6*s.* 2*d.*, and that the balance of the Expenditure above the Receipts for 1834 was 2,408 *l.* 14*s.* 4*d.*, and that the annual and regular demands on that Hospital, supposing the same number of inmates at the House of Occupation, and the same number of prisoners in Bridewell as last year, will be as follows: viz.

leaving but little surplus to meet any exigencies that the estates may require or may unfortunately occur by a greater number of committals of prisoners and vagrants, as well as to discharge a debt due at the end of last year, and borrowed from Bethlem, amounting to 944 *l.* 1*s.* 4*d.*

The Account shows that unusual demands have caused the debt incurred by this Hospital, and that it is those unusual demands which have exhausted the balance of the former year, and also created the aforesaid debt.

The Accounts show that the average number of prisoners or vagrants daily victualled was equal to 75 for a whole year, and the cost of maintenance of each for a whole year was 25 *l.* 4*s.* 10*d.*

That the number of prisoners and vagrants admitted was 813, which makes the cost of those committed, on the average throughout the year, 2 *l.* 6*s.* 7*d.* each.

which 685 *l.* 14 *s.* 3 *d.* cash balance, and 599 *l.* 8 *s.* 3 *d.* annual income, are, in strictness, applicable only to the purposes of the bequests, as before stated.

Bethlem Hospital Account consists of the Curable and Incurable Fund, the rental belonging to that fund being from estates in London, Kent and Hertfordshire, and in dividends applicable alike to both curable and incurable lunatics; and the Incurable Fund, which is Barkham's bequest of land in Lincolnshire, and which is specially by that bequest applicable to incurable lunatics only. The general Bethlem Account also embraces criminal lunatics; but as the Crown built its own wing of the Hospital, pays all expenses of repairs, and the Treasury do every Midsummer defray maintenance and all other expenses on account of criminals, such charge has no effect on either of the divisions of the Bethlem Account.

Fol. 33. The payment from the Crown has been settled for the future to be for each criminal 38 *l.* 6 *s.* 8 *d.* annually, independent of officers and keepers.

Your Committee find, as by an account presented with this Report, that the receipts for the Curable Fund amounted this year to 8,813 *l.* 1 *s.* 11 *d.*, that the money expended for the benefit of curable patients was 4,351 *l.* 10 *s.* 7 *d.*, and that of the remainder, the sum of 1,086 *l.* 7 *s.* 6 *d.*, was paid for purchase of property in Piccadilly and repairs, &c. in Hertfordshire; and that the remaining sum of 3,375 *l.* 3 *s.* 10 *d.* was unappropriated surplus balance.

This fund has also a debt due to it of 30,022 *l.* 2 *s.* 8 *d.*, which has never been charged with interest, but which must be returned to this fund, it having been advanced for the improvement of the Lincolnshire estate, for the purpose of building sea walls, drains, tunnels and other necessary works for securing to that estate the lands reclaimed from the sea, and also for building farm-houses, barns, &c., the result of which has been highly beneficial to the property.

The Hospital holding as lay impropiators the tithes, pay a curate, and have established a school on this estate.

Your Committee have before stated that the money expended from the Curable Fund for charitable purposes was only 4,351 *l.* 10 *s.* 7 *d.*, and that the number of lunatics relieved in the year was 341, so that the income was more than double the expenditure (without taking into consideration any interest for the money lent to the Lincolnshire estate.)

Fol. 30. A curable lunatic, maintained and clothed through a year, cost the Hospital 34 *l.* 2 *s.* 9 *d.*, and the expense of 341 curable lunatics admitted in the year averaged each 13 *l.* 4 *s.*, the average time each remained in the Hospital being 19 weeks.

On the examination of the Account for the Bethlem Incurable Fund, being the Lincolnshire estate, bequeathed by Barkham, it appears that the net income from the estate and dividends was, for 1834, 5,260 *l.* 7 *s.* 7 *d.*; that 70 patients were relieved at a cost of 2,210 *l.* 16 *s.*, but of which the friends of the patients contributed 1,376 *l.* 0 *s.* 9 *d.*, thereby showing, that from a receipt of 5,260 *l.* 7 *s.* 7 *d.*, only 834 *l.* 15 *s.* 3 *d.* was applied to the relief of incurable lunatics. Of the remainder, the sum of 2,858 *l.* 8 *s.* 6 *d.* was expended in improvements, and 1,567 *l.* 3 *s.* 10 *d.*, the balance, is applicable to the repayment of a part of the debt due to the Curable Establishment.

Your Committee consider that if two-thirds of the surplus of the Lincolnshire estate were annually applied to the liquidation of the debt, it would probably be discharged in 10 years, and this confusion of account be concluded, unless a future reduction of rent should be rendered necessary by increased agricultural difficulties.

Your Committee hardly need add, that whatever sum may be annually paid off, it ought not, as regards the Curable Fund, to be treated as income, but be invested as capital; the income only from such capital to be considered as applicable to the annual expense.

Fol. 32. An incurable lunatic cost for the past year, 31 *l.* 11 *s.* 8 *d.*, of which the Hospital contributed 11 *l.* 18 *s.* 6 *d.*, and the remaining 19 *l.* 13 *s.* 2 *d.* was paid by the friends of the patient.

The Committee proceeding to work the balance sheet first alluded to by them, as presented with this Report, had recourse to the Treasurer's cash-book, which was not a cash-book of daily receipts and payments, but a memorandum-book of receipts and payments without any dates. The Receiver informed the Committee that the Treasurer's private cash-book, above named, was not checked by him, but was accepted as presented by the Treasurer, together with a loose balance sheet, and that both were laid on the table of the Monthly House Committee. Your Committee were also informed by the Treasurer, that he had no separate account at any

any banker's for these Hospitals, and that the monies in his hands belonging to them, were mixed with, and formed part of his private account at his banker's; it followed, that your Committee could not have the use of a banker's pass-book to ascertain the dates; and as the Treasurer's official cash-book, kept by the Receiver, was also without dates, your Committee directed the Receiver to transcribe the Account into a new book, arranging the payments and receipts according to their respective dates, and making rests in the Account to accord with the dates at which the several Balances were reported to the Monthly House Committee.

The Account so made out, was produced, as will be seen by the Minute Book, fol. 10 and 11, and by which abstract it will appear, that no attempt was ever made to have the Balances accurately recorded, except on two occasions when the Annual Account was made out; all the others show incorrect entries on the Minutes and Monthly Statements, which never could have existed, if a regular cash-book had been kept, recording daily the receipts and payments. The printed rules and regulations of the Hospitals are sufficiently imperative on that point; if they had been attended to, this state of confusion could never have existed.

When the surplus Balance of cash in the Treasurer's hands is large, he invests in the public funds as much as in his own discretion he thinks right, and not according to the direction of the Monthly House Committee, from whom, your Committee suggest, the order ought properly to proceed.

It now becomes the duty of your Committee to notice some omissions which cannot be corrected without the special order of the Court:—

1st. A Benefaction from Mr. Porker of 50 *l.*, which was paid to the Treasurer 5 June 1833.

2d. A similar Benefaction by Mr. Gilpin, also paid to the Treasurer 5 June 1833.

3d. A Benefaction by Mr. Kenyon of 50 *l.*, paid to the Treasurer 26 September 1833.

4th. A Benefaction by Mr. Comyn of 50 *l.*, which was paid to the Treasurer 24 June 1834.

Neither of which four sums of 50 *l.* each, have been carried to the credit of the Hospitals.

Enquiry being made as to such omissions, the Treasurer, Clerk and Receiver attended the Committee on the 3d and 10th of June, and severally explained, as may be seen by reference to the Minute Book, fol. 38, 39, 40 and 50.

To enter them now at the respective times they ought to have been credited, is impossible, without disturbing all the Balances in your ledgers, and the audited Accounts of the last two years, as well as the Accounts now presented, and which do agree with the ledgers.

Your Committee therefore request that the Court will order them to be entered as Benefactions, with their proper dates, but to the respective Accounts for the present year, and that the Treasurer's Balance may be charged accordingly.

The Committee believe that the form of entry ordered at the April Court to be in future observed by the Monthly Committee, as regards Cash Balances, will be of great use in preventing mistakes, and accurately showing the monthly Balances; but unless a regular Cash-book of receipts and payments, daily entered, be kept, no form that may be adopted can be relied on as accurate.

Your Committee feel that, under all the circumstances, they may venture to recommend a change to the following effect:—

That an account be opened at a banking-house of known responsibility, in the names of the President, Treasurer and Governors of Bridewell and Bethlem Hospitals, and that the Treasurer be directed to pay his Balances to such Account at such time as the Court shall order.

That the Treasurer be directed in future to pay as soon as received all Dividends, Legacies, Benefactions, or other Monies that may come into his hands on account of these Hospitals to such Banker.

That the Receiver be directed, on a day to be fixed, to pay his Balance of Cash received to the same Account.

That the Steward of Bethlem be directed to pay every Saturday his Balance of Cash received and in hand to the same Account, and that the custom of paying weekly demands upon the Hospital out of money received by him for any purpose be discontinued, and that the Monthly Committee be instructed to advance him what money may be required for the weekly payments.

The usual receipts from Dividends and Rent immediately after Midsummer is about 2,400 l.

If so large a Balance should not be required to meet the demands on the Hospital, a part of it should be immediately invested in the Funds.

Your Committee recommend that nine members of the Committee have power given them to sign drafts, and that the signatures of any two of them, together with the counter-signature of the Treasurer, shall be authority to the Banker for payment, and that the Banker's pass-book, checked by the Receiver, be delivered to every Monthly Committee, and if it should please the Court to adopt the recommendation of this Committee, they are of opinion all errors will in future, if not wholly avoided, be immediately detected.

Your Committee are aware that this arrangement will deprive the Treasurer of any advantage he may make from the use of the Balance in hand, which is his only emolument for his services beyond the honour attending the office, the house free of rent and taxes, and 15 chaldrons of coals annually.

The security ordered by the Court's rules to be given by the Treasurer is for 3,000 l., therefore your Committee consider the Court estimated that sum as the average Balance, and they think the Treasurer ought to be paid for his services, but that payment by use of the monies of the Hospital is the worst of all modes; but on this point, further than they have done, your Committee do not think it would be proper for them to offer any suggestion to the Court; but the presence of the Treasurer being at all times essential to enforce the rules laid down, and superintend the good government of these Hospitals, it occurs to them that it would be well to define what is intended by residence.

Your Committee have also to observe that the mode of book-keeping in the Receiver's and Accountant's Office is confused, and they recommend that a competent person be consulted, in order that a simpler mode of keeping the Ledgers and other books may be pointed out and adopted.

Your Committee recommend that the Court should order a rule to be observed to the effect that no Governor, officer or servant of the Hospitals be concerned in the supply of any article required for the use of, or to be paid for out of the funds of these Hospitals, and that no officer or servant be allowed to order any expenditure beyond a fixed sum, to be limited by the Committee, without its special direction.

Your Committee, in conclusion, beg to say, that although it has been their painful duty to point out many errors and irregularities which must be anything but agreeable to those whose duty it was, by strictly observing the rules and regulations of the Hospital, as laid down, to have prevented them, they have not the slightest intention, by any observations, to convey any reflections on the integrity of any officer to whom the remarks in this Report may apply; but that in every observation and recommendation recorded by them, they have been guided only by that imperative duty which was imposed on them when they severally received the charge as a Governor of Bridewell and Bethlem Hospitals.

Your Committee present this as their Report, together with the Book of Minutes of their proceedings, and the several Accounts referred to in the Report.

REPORT of the Special Committee, appointed by a Resolution of the Special General Court of Governors, holden on the 20th day of July last, for the purpose of investigating the whole Affairs of the Hospitals, and to report specially.

YOUR Committee, in pursuance of the power given to them, immediately employed Mr. Edward Richards Adams, an experienced accountant, to assist them in the investigation of the books and accounts of both Hospitals.

Mr. Hudson attended the Committee on the 29th of July, and stated that the representations made by him, that the Balance in his hands on the 31st of December last was 1,377*l.* 18*s.* 7*d.* only, was incorrect; for that he had since discovered errors to the amount of 3,324*l.* 15*s.* 3*d.*, being annual balances which he had not paid to the Treasurer, thereby admitting that the Balance in his hands, on the 31st December last, was 4,702*l.* 13*s.* 10*d.*

Mr. Hudson at the same time stated to the Committee, that he had on that morning paid to the Treasurer's Bankers 4,286*l.* 6*s.* 5*d.*, being the entire Balance due from him as Receiver.

The Treasurer was present at this communication, and the Committee recommended the Treasurer to immediately invest 4,000*l.* of the money in the public funds, in the names of the Trustees of the Hospitals.

Mr. Adams proceeded with the investigation of the Receiver's Accounts; and, having discovered many errors in the books and accounts, he summoned a meeting of your Committee on the 15th instant, at which he made the following communication:

That the Books, Accounts and Statements were in a very irregular and incorrect state; that he had discovered very many errors in the Receiver's Accounts:

That although the time he had been engaged on the Books had not enabled him to examine the whole of the Receiver's Accounts, yet he had discovered errors to the amount of upwards of 8,000*l.*; being receipts by Mr. Hudson, which he had not accounted for:

That Mr. Hudson admitted the errors, and that he had not accounted for the money:

That he had communicated on the subject with Mr. Hudson, and his relation Mr. Bolton, who assured him that they had no doubt of making arrangements, which would enable them, on Tuesday the 18th instant, to make satisfactory proposals for the immediate payment of a considerable part, and to give satisfactory security for the remainder.

The Committee requested the attendance of the President, to whom Mr. Adams's Report was communicated. The Committee, with the approval of the President, adjourned to Tuesday the 18th instant.

On Tuesday the President and Committee assembled; Mr. Metcalfe and Mr. Bolton, two friends of Mr. Hudson, attended, and requested that no communication should be made to the Court for a week or ten days—to give them time to raise the money, or provide good security. The Committee, under the circumstances,

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declined to accede to the request ; but consented to adjourn to the next day (Wednesday), upon the assurance of Mr. Metcalfe and Mr. Bolton that they had every hope, almost certainty, of paying near 5,000*l.* in money, and giving security for the remainder ; and upon their positive undertaking that Mr. Hudson should not go away, but that he should remain at the Hospital.

The President considered that it would be improper to permit the books and papers of the Hospitals to remain in the possession of Mr. Hudson ; and he therefore gave an authority to Mr. Adams to take possession of them, which he did accordingly.

On Wednesday the 19th Mr. Metcalfe again attended the Committee, and stated, that although the friends of Mr. Hudson had made great exertions to raise the money or procure security, they were unable to provide either, and requested further time ; but declined to give the President and Committee any positive assurance that the money would be paid or good security given.

Under these circumstances the President and Committee considered it to be their duty to secure the person of Mr. Hudson, and directions were accordingly given to an officer for that purpose : upon his arrival at the Hospital, Mr. Hudson was there, but escaped before the officer could secure him.

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SINCE the last Report your Committee have continued their inquiry into the state of the Accounts of the several persons accounting with the Hospitals, and examining how far the duties enjoined by the Book of Regulations to be observed by all the officers and servants of the Hospital are complied with, but they have not yet made sufficient progress to report finally thereon.

Mr. Adams having made one report to the Committee on the late Receivers' accounts, and another even more important on the Treasurer's accounts, your Committee feel they best discharge their duty to the Court by presenting them, without loss of time and without comment, leaving the Treasurer to give his own explanation to the Court, and the Court to come to its own conclusions, without bias by the observations of your Committee on subjects of such fearful consequences, whether viewed as regarding the funds of the Hospitals or the character of the Treasurer, but earnestly pressing on the Court the early adoption of the recommendations contained in their first report with reference to the future security of the funds of the Hospitals, or such other regulations as it may consider better calculated to produce the same effect.

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Gentlemen,

IN pursuance of your directions to me to report, in the first instance, on "Mr. Hudson, the late Receiver's Accounts, from the time of the present Treasurer's appointment to the day of Mr. Hudson's dismissal," I beg leave to report that, upon Thomas Coles, esq. being appointed Treasurer, in the year 1831, new ledgers and cash-books were provided for the Accounts of both Hospitals.

The Accounts for both Hospitals, for the year ending 31 December 1830, were audited 25 March 1831, and signed by the Treasurer and Auditors.

The Accounts for the year 1831 were audited 3 April 1832, and signed by the Auditors.

The Accounts for the year 1832 were audited 11 April 1833, and signed by the Auditors.

The Accounts for 1833 were audited 8 April 1834, and signed by the Auditors.

The Accounts for 1834 were audited 30 March 1835, and signed by the Auditors.

The Accounts audited 25 March 1831 stated the particulars of arrears of rent due to the Hospitals on the 31st of December preceding.

Upon examining the books, and the accounts of the several tenants in the ledgers, I have ascertained that the late Receiver has received many sums, part of the arrears stated to be due on the 31st of December 1830, amounting to 2,165*l.*, 10*s.* 6*d.*, and has not accounted for it.

In order to prevent detection, the Receiver entered the receipts to the credit of the respective accounts in the old ledger, under dates antecedent to the 1st of January 1831, and made no entry whatever of the receipts in the new ledgers.

The following are the particulars of the sums so received and not accounted for, and the dates entered in the ledgers :

These sums have all folios of the cash-books placed against them, as if they were regularly entered in the cash-book, and are marked ✓ to represent that they had been examined, and found in the cash-book and accounted for, although not one of them has been accounted for to the Hospitals. It is plain that these entries have been made since the Accounts were audited in 1831.

In the annual statement of the Hospitals for the year ending 31 December 1831, audited 3 April 1832, the arrears of rent which remained due at the preceding audit to 31 December 1830, are entered incorrectly by making the arrears due from the tenants mentioned so much less than the respective sums received by the Receiver, and not accounted for by him.

The fact of these rents having been stated in the Accounts to 31 December 1830, which were audited 25 March 1831 as being then in arrear and due to the Hospitals, and credit having been given in the ledgers subsequent to the audit for the receipts, although entered in the ledgers as of antecedent dates, is a presumption that they have been received since 31 December 1830, but it is not conclusive evidence, and the fact cannot be known but on application to the respective tenants to ascertain from their receipts on what days they actually paid the rents to the Receiver.

The following sums have also been received by the Receiver, and passed to the credit of the several tenants in the ledgers in discharge of their rents due to the Hospitals, no part of which has been accounted for by him :

These sums have also the folios of the cash-books attached to them, to represent that they are in the cash-books and accounted for, and they are marked thus ✓, as evidence that they had been examined and found correct. Some of them are in the cash-books, but are not included in the additions, which proves that they have been put there subsequent to the audits.

The arrears of rent of the preceding year have been entered incorrectly in every annual statement of the rents since 1830. This has evidently been done to cover the irregularities in the Cash Accounts.

I have partly examined the Accounts of the Receiver prior to the 1st of January 1831, and have discovered errors to the amount of 2,854*l.* 7*s.*, being receipts by him not accounted for.

The Receiver has not accounted for the tithes of Wainfleet, subsequent to Lady-day 1834. It is stated by the tenants, that the tithes have been paid to Lady-day 1835. One year's tithe is about 450*l.*; the amount cannot be ascertained till Mr. Bower the Lincolnshire Agent furnishes his account. Three letters have been written to Mr. Bower for his accounts, but they have not been received.

Mr. Hudson admitted that he had received very many rents for small houses and tenements at Wapping, which are not in the Rental, because they were tenants at will, and constantly changing; and that he had not entered the receipts of these rents in the cash-book, and had not, consequently, accounted for them: he stated the amount to be about 500*l.*

REPORT of Mr. ADAMS, on the Treasurer.

To the Special Committee of Governors.

Gentlemen,

IN pursuance of your directions I have proceeded to examine the Accounts of Thomas Coles, Esq., the Treasurer, and beg leave to report,

That upon the appointment of Mr. Coles to the office of Treasurer, in February 1831, new books were provided for both Hospitals.

For Bridewell: The Treasurer's Cash-book, the Receiver's Cash-book, Ledger and Rental.

For Bethlem: The Treasurer's Cash-book, the Receiver's Cash-book, Ledger and Rental.

These books purport to contain the whole Accounts of both Hospitals.

The Accounts have been audited annually to the 31st day of December in each year, and signed by the Auditors.

The practice being, to include the receipts to the end of the year, but to allow credit for all debts due by the Hospitals at that date as if actually paid, although they were not paid till the following year, the Receiver did not pay to the Treasurer the monies as and when received by him, but made payments to him from time to time on account: these payments are charged in the Receiver's Cash-books, and the receipt of them acknowledged in the Treasurer's Cash-books.

Upon many occasions the Receiver paid tradesmen's bills and accounts, the amount of which he charged to the Treasurer as so much cash, which the Treasurer acknowledged in like manner.

It does not appear that the Treasurer and Receiver have settled or agreed their accounts from the commencement, in February 1831.

At every audit the Balances of the Receiver's Cash-books, to the end of the preceding year, are charged as having been paid by him to the Treasurer, and the receipt regularly acknowledged in the Treasurer's Cash-books; and so presented to the Auditors, and audited by them.

The statements, signed by the Auditors and printed, treat the whole Balance as in the hands of the Treasurer.

The Treasurer, however, insists that the books marked "Treasurer's Cash-book," and headed "Thomas Coles, Esq., Treasurer," and which have upon all occasions

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the Treasurer.

been produced to the Auditors as his Cash-books (audited and signed by them as such), are not his Cash-books, and that he is not bound by entries in them.

No other Cash-books were produced to the Auditors by the Treasurer.

The Balance in hand therefore on the 31st December 1834, was 12,356*l.* 3*s.* 6*d.*, subject, of course, to the payment of accounts to the end of the year, when audited and ordered for payment.

The 3,800*l.* Three per cent. Consols were not purchased out of the Balance in hand on the 31st December, but with money subsequently paid to the Treasurer by the Receiver for that express purpose.

Without going into a discussion whether the Treasurer is or is not bound by the entries in the Cash-books which were produced as his at every audit, in his presence,

sence, and without the least denial on his part,—on the contrary, with his acquiescence, these being the only Cash-books which were ever produced,—I considered it better to investigate the Accounts of the Treasurer, as entered by himself in a book which he produced to the Committee as containing all his receipts and all his payments on account of the Hospitals.

At the Monthly Meetings of the House Committee, reports were made of the Balance in the hands of the Treasurer. The Balances so reported were not taken from the book now produced by the Treasurer, but from sheets of paper which the Treasurer furnished to the Receiver monthly for that purpose, but which do not contain the dates of the receipts or of the payments.

I have left the question of the Treasurer's liability to the entries in the Treasurer's Cash-books produced to and audited by the auditors, quite open for the consideration of the Committee. I may, however, be permitted to add, that it appears to me very difficult for the Treasurer to dispute the receipt of payments to him, which are charged by the Receiver in the Cash-books audited annually in his presence; and upon two occasions (*i. e.* for the year 1831, audited 3d April 1832; and for the year 1833, audited 8th April 1834) the books are signed by the Treasurer himself, with the following attestation: "The vouchers compared with the charges and found to agree; the castings on both sides examined and are correct, as are also the postings into the Ledger and Treasurer's Cash-book." This appears to me to be a complete admission of the receipt of the money from the Receiver, and an unequivocal recognition of the Treasurer's Cash-books.

Upon examining the book produced by the Treasurer, it appears that the late Receiver has charged various sums of money paid to the Treasurer (which are mentioned in Account A. annexed), and which he has not entered in his Cash-book as received, amounting to - - - - - £. 7,674 5 5

This Balance will be reduced by the payments the Treasurer has made since the 2d instant: the amount I do not know.

There are yet some vouchers wanting for payments charged by the Treasurer, which the Treasurer will produce.

In the Accounts for the year ending 31st December 1832, audited 11th April 1833, a charge is made under date December 1832, for the purchase of 1,200 *l.* Three per cent. Consols, at 88, and commission, 1,067 *l.* 10 *s.*

This purchase is charged in December 1832. In the Accounts printed, it is stated, that it was in the Funds at that date, and the cost is deducted from the Balance of Cash in the hands of the Treasurer on that day. The Accounts in which the charge is made and allowed were audited on the 11th of April 1833; the purchase, however, was not made till the 22d of May following.

This stock was not bought out of the Balance in the hands of the Treasurer at Christmas, but from money subsequently received by him.

The only voucher found for this charge is a note from the Treasurer, addressed to the late Receiver, without a date; the following is a copy of it.

In the Treasurer's book, which I have already mentioned, produced by him as containing all his receipts and payments on account of the Hospitals, there is an entry in April 1834, charging the purchase of this stock thus :

3,900 *l.* Three per cent. Consols, at 91 - - - £. 3,549

The Treasurer has given credit for the Dividends on this Stock, due July 1834, January 1835, and July 1835.

As no voucher could be found for the purchase of this Stock, it became necessary to examine the books of the Bank of England to ascertain whether the Stock had or had not been purchased.

It appears that the Stock has not been purchased, but that on the 6th of May, in the present year, 3,900 *l.* Three per cent. Consols were transferred into the names of the Trustees of the Hospitals (Sir R. C. Glyn, Thomas Coles, esq., and Colonel Clitherow) by Thomas Coles, esq. of Thornton Heath, and Mr. William Coles, jun. of Mincing-lane, survivors, in account with a gentleman deceased.

The Treasurer admits that he did not purchase the Stock as charged in his Accounts, and states that he and Mr. Wm. Coles, jun. are the surviving executors and trustees of a gentleman deceased, who devised a large sum in the public funds to them in trust, the dividends to be paid to his daughter for life, and after her decease the principal to be divided between her three children, with the benefit of survivorship; that the children have, since the death of their grandfather, agreed that each shall have a vested interest in one-third on the death of their mother; that he has advanced considerable sums of money to one of the sons, in respect of his one-third, and that in repayment of these advances it was agreed that 3,900 *l.* Three per cent. Consols should be transferred to the Trustees of the Hospital; that this was done with the knowledge and consent of all parties.

I have seen a copy of the will and agreement making the interest of each child a vested interest, but I have not seen any account of advances, nor any consent for the transfer of the consols.

In the Accounts for the year ending 31 December 1834, audited 30 March 1835, a charge is made in the books under date thus :

31 December 1834, for the purchase of 3,800 *l.* Three per cent. Consols, and commission, at 92  $\frac{1}{2}$  - £. 3,505 10 *s.*; and this sum is deducted from the balance in the hands of the Treasurer at that date, and in the annual Statement of the Hospitals this stock is entered as having been purchased on or before the 31st December 1834, and forming part of the Hospitals' property in the public funds on that day.

IN reference to the Report just read, I have to observe, that when I first entered upon office, I found filling the double office of Receiver and Accountant a gentleman, at that time considered of irreproachable character, and holding a high official situation in the Court of Common Pleas, who had enjoyed the fullest confidence of the Governors of these Hospitals, and who had for many years conducted himself to your entire satisfaction.

It cannot excite surprise that, under such circumstances, I should have looked upon him in the same favourable light in which he was then universally considered, and, in common with yourselves, I should have placed the most implicit confidence in him.

It was in this state of things that I unfortunately, and I admit negligently, suffered him to make the entries in the book referred to, in your Accountant's Report, as the Treasurer's Cash-book, the consequence of which has been that he has entered various sums as paid to me, which never were paid, and of which I was entirely ignorant until the disclosures which were made by himself at the meetings of the Select Committee.

I beg to state unequivocally, and most positively, that every shilling of the money which I have received belonging to the Hospitals, has been paid according to your orders, and that the deficiency now existing, is attributable solely to the defalcations and false entries of the late Receiver, which the Minutes of the Committee fully substantiate.

If my conduct has laid me open to censure, which I am compelled to admit it in some respects deserves, this has arisen from misplaced confidence, as already stated; and as, from the judicious arrangements now made, a like misfortune cannot again occur, I trust the Governors will be satisfied with this statement.

THE Committee beg to report to the Court, that a case had been drawn up and submitted to Sir John Campbell (the Attorney-General), Sir Frederick Pollock, and Mr. Pemberton for their joint opinion, and that upon consultation thereon, they unanimously advised actions to be brought for the monies now claimed by the Hospitals from the late Treasurer, which actions have since been commenced in the Court of King's Bench, and are now proceeding.

The Committee further report, that having addressed a letter to Mr. William Horsey, one of the Securities of the late Treasurer, they had been informed by his Executors, that he had died so far back as the month of June 1832, and that a similar letter was sent to Mr. Charles Coles, the other Security, who had not returned any answer.

The Committee further report, that they have taken measures to procure payment of the Bonds of Mr. Bower's Securities with every prospect of shortly receiving the money.

## Report of Mr. Poynder to the Special Committee.

MR. POYNDER reported that, since the meeting of the last Finance Committee, the two actions at common law had proceeded against the late Treasurer, and that after they had been set down for trial as special jury cases at the last London Sittings, and notice of trial had been given by him, the defendant had filed two bills in the Court of Exchequer, each being of considerable length and requiring immediate answers to be put in under the corporate seals of the two Hospitals, and the oaths of four of the Auditors of the Accounts, viz.: Colonel Clitherow, Mr. Greenaway, Mr. Farncomb and Mr. Martyr; that inasmuch as without the greatest exertion, the plaintiff in equity would have taken his injunction within a week, as a matter of course, he (Mr. P.) had deemed it his duty, with the concurrence of the Auditors, to call in the aid of Mr. Bichner, an Equity Barrister, who had, contrary to usage, entirely devoted himself, at the Hospital, to the preparation of four distinct answers, which it had been eventually found practicable to engross, and place on the file of the Court, in sufficient time to prevent the injunction being issued for want of answers, but that (notwithstanding this circumstance) the Court of Exchequer had been moved by the late Treasurer within a few days afterwards, and only one day before the trials at law should have come on, for the purpose of compelling the Governors to carry in the Hospital Books and Records to the Court of Equity, and to proceed in such Court in preference to the Court of King's Bench; that he (Mr. Poynder) had in consequence deemed it necessary to carry Sir William Follett into the Court of Exchequer specially, together with the additional aid of Mr. Bichner and Mr. Butt, who (after a long argument against the opposite Counsel) had succeeded in inducing Lord Abinger, the Chief Baron, to consent to a postponement of the trials at law to the following Friday the 26th February, without diverting the course into the Exchequer—such decision, however, being subject to the Governors allowing the Counsel, Solicitor, Accountant, and Agents of the late Treasurer to inspect, in the interval, the Books, Accounts and Records of the two Hospitals, and to make all such copies and extracts of such documents as they might deem necessary; that such inspection had in consequence taken place, and that several clerks had been employed at the Hospital by the Solicitors of the late Treasurer for some days and nights in collecting and copying the information deemed necessary to this purpose, after which the trial for Bridewell Hospital had come on, upon Friday last the 26th February, when, after a hearing of several hours, the jury returned a verdict for the Governors of that Hospital, and found the damages of 1,513 *l.* 15*s.* 11*d.*, as per following particulars.

*Note.*—The apparently large proportion of deaths in the above statement is to be accounted for by the practice of the committee of the Cheshire Lunatic Asylum not returning pauper patients to their respective parishes or townships, prior to 1836, as relieved, harmless, incurable, or on trial. Unless perfectly cured they were retained in the asylum, the committee considering, as not only for the cure of curable cases, but equally as a refuge for the uncured or incurable: thus a large proportion of the 71 deaths, where such cases as in most other asylums would have been dismissed under one or other of the before-mentioned heads. In fact the asylum has hitherto been a *Maison de Santé* and a *Maison de Détention*.

Occupation.

Occupation.—There are 10 acres of ground attached to the asylum, laid out in gardens, potato-fields, airing-grounds and plantation. In these the male patients, used to husbandry or spade-labour, are constantly employed. We have met with no accident or evil from the use of spades or other garden implements: whenever quarrels or blows occur it has invariably happened during the confinement of the patients to their wards or day-rooms. Glaziers, painters, plasterers and white-washers have been led to exercise their respective callings for the use of the institution, and this, although in many instances it was necessary that their work should be revised and amended by more regular workmen. Wheelwrights, carpenters and cabinet-makers have worked in their respective vocations, but not steadily; more frequently preferring out-of-door employment in company with their agricultural companions. Of six shoemakers one only worked efficiently, the others choosing more general and active employment. A considerable proportion of both sexes confined their exertions to the discharge of domestic offices, assisting the nurses and keepers in the daily process of cleaning the wards, bed-rooms and offices. The house being supplied with water by a forcing-pump somewhat similar to that in use at Bethlem, from 10 to 12 men are employed daily in turning this pump. In bad weather the whole of the out-of-door workers are so employed, during two or three hours, twice a day; the water-cisterns are let off to sluice the main drains once or twice weekly, accordingly as the state of the weather increases or diminishes the numbers working at the pump, and thus active employment of a healthy nature is at all times to be obtained. The pump is found of much use as a means of inducing those patients to take exercise who are unable or unwilling to exert themselves in any more direct or laborious pursuit; the pump, placed under an open shade in rear of the airing-grounds, is so easily turned that it may be worked by four men, whilst its levers are so long as to allow of 24 men being exercised there at the same time.

The females are chiefly employed in the wash-house, in sewing, and in making and mending clothes, the whole of the linen and bedding being made by them under the superintendence of the nurses. With the assistance, and under the direction of one laundry-woman, the whole of the washing of the establishment, both household and personal, is performed by the patients.

Extra meals are given to the weakly. Extra diet and more choice food, tea, coffee, &c., &c., is allowed for the sick.

Officers and Servants.—Physician and general director; resident apothecary and superintendent; matron; two male keepers in the wards; two female keepers; a gardener, who acts as superintending keeper over such patients as work without the walls; an inner porter, who acts as superintending keeper within the walls; a man cook and baker, who delivers the dinners, &c., into the respective wards, and is called upon when needful to assist generally; an outer lodge porter; a laundress; two house (female) servants; an occasional accountant; the clerk of the peace for the county is law-agent.

Each patient has a separate sleeping-room, unless occasionally. There is no infirmary. The male and female patients are widely separated, by the intervention of the officers, house and offices. The weekly charge for the county paupers has been, and is as follows:

Pauper patients, from other counties, are charged 12 s. per week. A few private patients are received, who pay from 15 s. to 42 s. per week, according to special agreement with the committee, or the clerk acting by their directions.

The number of patients, not paupers, received since opening the asylum in 1829, has been 42, the greater part having paid 15 s. or 21 s. per week.

There is no regular dietary, the patients having food suitable to their respective cases and classes. Having neither workshops, nor artificers to direct the patients, they are employed, when convalescent, in gardening, and about the house: their number is constantly varying. There is only one medical officer—a resident physician—who is also superintendent. There are seven male attendants, one of whom is baker and gardener, another tailor and porter; and three nurses. There is no Infirmary. The charge for paupers is 8 s. per week; others are received at from 12 s. 6 d. to 31 s. 6 d. per week.

The medical attendants may allow tea and sugar instead of porridge for breakfast; and instead of cheese and beer for supper to such of the patients as they deem expedient.

*N. B.*—Tea and sugar allowed for breakfast to all the females.

For *Dinner*.—Sunday, Roast meat, 8 ounces when dressed, free of bone, with puddings, baked, and vegetables, bread, 4 ounces, and 1 pint of good table-beer.

Monday, rice pudding, baked, with 4 ounces of bread, and 1 pint of table-beer.

Tuesday, boiled mutton, 8 ounces when dressed, free of bone, with suet dumplings and vegetables, 4 ounces of bread, and one pint of table-beer.

Wednesday, broth from meat of the preceding day, and bones boiled down, thickened with peas, barley or vegetables, 4 ounces of bread, and 1 pint of table-beer.

Thursday, boiled beef, with vegetables; 4 ounces of bread, and 1 pint of table-beer.

Friday, broth or soup, made from the meat dressed the day before, and the bones boiled down, thickened with peas, barley or vegetables, 4 ounces of bread, and 1 pint of table-beer.

Saturday, Irish stews, or baked pies, made from the remaining cold meat, with other meat, sufficient cut up and added to the stew or pies, with potatoes, onions, &c., and bread and beer as usual.

Extra for Sick.—Fish, mutton broth, beef tea, puddings, eggs, wine, ale, tea and sugar, milk, &c., or whatever is directed by the medical officers.

Modes of occupations are various, such as gardening and domestic employment; house-cleaning, washing, scouring, knitting, white-washing, painting, carpentry, or any thing as occasion may require.

Number employed.—No definite number; but any patient who can be entrusted with an implement is found some occupation, be it ever so trivial.

Number of Medical Officers.—One physician in ordinary, 1 consulting physician, 1 consulting surgeon, and 1 resident surgeon, who is superintendent. Number of male servants, 6; number of female servants, 6; besides the domestic and other servants.

A separate infirmary for males and females. The weekly charge for each patient is 10 s. There are other than pauper patients.

*Breakfast.*—Every morning, porridge, of oatmeal and milk, with 6 ounces of bread, for all the patients.

*Supper.*—Every day, bread, 6 ounces, cheese, 2 ounces, or butter, half an ounce, and 1 pint of table-beer.

*Dinner.*—Sunday, roast meat, 8 ounces when dressed, free from bone, with vegetables, 4 ounces of bread, and 1 pint of table-beer.

Monday, broth, made from the meat of the preceding day, and bones or shins of beef thickened with barley and vegetables, 6 or 8 ounces of bread, and one pint of table-beer.

Tuesday, roast or boiled meat, 8 ounces of vegetables, bread, 4 ounces, one pint of table-beer.

Wednesday, rice or suet pudding, 4 ounces of bread, and 1 pint of table-beer.

Thursday, boiled beef, vegetables, bread and beer in quantities as before.

Friday, suet puddings for all the patients, and beer as before.

Saturday, meat pies or puddings, vegetables, and beer as before.

*Keepers' Diet.*—Meat, 1 pound, free from bone when dressed, bread, 1 ½ pound, table-beer, 4 pints each per day, cheese, 1 pound, butter, half a pound each per week.

*Nurses' Diet.*—Meat, half a pound, free from bone when dressed, bread, 1 ½ pound, table-beer, 2 pints each per day, cheese, 1 pound, butter, half a pound, tea, 2 ounces, brown sugar, half a pound each per week.

The male patients, who are incapable of employment, have 6 ounces of meat instead of 8 ounces, and half a pint of table-beer with their dinner and supper instead of a pint. The women have tea in the evening, with half an ounce of butter instead of cheese, and 6 ounces of bread; they have 4 ounces of meat instead of 8 ounces at dinner; one ounce of tea and two ounces of sugar are allowed each female patient per week. The patients, who work in the grounds and laundry, have a luncheon of bread and cheese and beer. The servants of the house have no stated allowance of meat or bread, but have the same quantity of cheese and butter as the nurses.

*Modes of Occupation.*—About 12 of the male patients are employed in the garden and grounds; about eight are employed in occasionally carrying water, weeding, cleaning the galleries, &c.; three are employed as shoemakers; two are employed as carpenters; two assist the brewer and baker; two assist in the kitchen; one is employed in making straw mats; one is employed in repairing sackings occasionally; one turns the mangle.

About 12 female patients are employed in the wash-house and laundry; about 12 are employed at needle-work; two assist in the kitchen; two assist the nurses in cleaning the galleries and sleeping-rooms; one assists occasionally cleaning the house.

*Medical Officers.*—A consulting physician; a consulting surgeon; a medical superintendent.

A physician has not yet been appointed, in consequence of the asylum having never been full of patients.

*Keepers.*—Six male keepers; six female keepers.

*Infirmary.*—At present there is no infirmary; but a separate one for each sex is about to be immediately erected.

*Rate of Payment.*—The weekly charge for patients, sent from parishes contributing to the rates, is 9 s.; and from parishes which have local jurisdictions, 10 s.

No patients, except pauper and criminal lunatics, are kept in the asylum.

By the desire of the committee I enclose you a return of the patients admitted, &c., &c. into this establishment since its commencement. In addition, I beg to observe that we have an infirmary for the female patients, but not one for the males, in consequence of there not being a convenient place for that purpose. The weekly charge for each patient is 5 s. 10 d., which covers the food, clothing, attendance, and every other expense except the repairs of the building. None other than pauper patients are kept in the asylum. I send also our last report, and a copy of the rules which contains the Diet Table. It is right, however, to state that we are obliged to make many deviations from it. Nearly all the patients admitted into this institution are old incurable cases, who have been the probationary time of 12 months, either in Bethlem or St. Luke's, or have been confined in some private madhouse, and as they remain here until death we have consequently a great many who, from old age or debility, require a different diet; this, however, is always allowed to whatever extent may be found desirable. I have thought it necessary to mention this circumstance to account for the difference that may be found, on examination, to exist between what is the regular diet, and what appears by the account to be actually consumed. Any other information you may require I shall be most happy to communicate.

The THIRTY-FOURTH REPORT of the Visiting Justices, and the Fifth Report of the Resident Physician and Treasurer of the Middlesex Pauper Lunatic Asylum, January 1836.

To His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of *Middlesex*, in Quarter Session assembled.

The Thirty-fourth Report of the Visiting Justices appointed to superintend the Building, Erection and Management of the County Lunatic Asylum at *Hanwell*.

AT the close of every year since the asylum has been opened for the reception of patients, the court have seemed to expect, and your committee have therefore deemed it right to present, a summary of those reports which have been previously made at the end of each quarter. In compliance with this practice, they now beg leave to lay before the court their Thirty-fourth Report.

In the early part of the year many parishes were very urgent in their applications for the admission of a greater number of patients. Your committee were consequently induced to make an inspection of the building; and they found that, by a different appropriation of some of the rooms, and a trifling outlay, 30 additional patients could be received without incommoding those already in the institution. It was stated in the 26th report, that some rooms which had been occupied in the basement of the west tower had been found damp, and had therefore been abandoned. On more minute inspection, however, it was ascertained that the dampness arose from there being no areas in the front of some parts of the rooms. The patients were therefore set to work to make the necessary excavations; these have been properly secured by a wall, and have completely removed what was objectionable, and the rooms are again inhabited. Your committee have personally inspected them in the wettest weather, and have uniformly found them perfectly dry and well ventilated. The asylum now contains 604 patients, a number rather more than double that for which it was originally intended. Your committee cannot but congratulate the county on this circumstance, as it far exceeds anything that could have been contemplated; and more particularly as this great augmentation has been made without producing an unwholesome crowding of the patients, and without any pecuniary call upon the county, except for 284*l.* 15*s.* 6*d.*\*, which sum has been expended since the 30th of last April, when the court determined that the savings should no longer be applied to the building account. Your committee have been also enabled gradually to reduce the weekly payments for each patient to 6*s.* 5*d.*; and, on examining the accounts to the close of the year, they find the balance in favour of the institution so much increased, that they have directed the rate to be still further reduced to 5*s.* 10*d.* for each patient. This reduction has been effected without any diminution of the comforts of the patients, as their welfare is felt to be the primary object of the institution; at the same time the strictest economy compatible with that is uniformly practised.

Every article of importance consumed in the establishment is regularly contracted for every three months, and the bills paid with such promptness as to ensure the articles being offered at the lowest prices. The labour of the patients themselves contributes not a little to keep down the weekly rates. They are not only profitably employed in doing much of the mechanical work which would otherwise have to be paid for by the county; but they effect a great saving from the making the shoes, clothing, &c., and supplying in a great measure the place of servants in the institution.

Your committee regret to state, that the only supply of water at present available is from the canal; and it is therefore necessarily uncertain when any particularly dry season occurs, as in the last summer. The institution is consequently placed in great jeopardy lest the supply should be entirely cut off. To prevent the possibility of so distressing an event taking place, your committee have to propose that a tank be excavated to receive the overflow water from a spring which has been bored to and found at a depth of nearly 300 feet. From this source there is every reason to expect a sufficient quantity of this most necessary article, to render the establishment so independent of any other supply that no anxiety on that subject need be felt in any state of the weather. Under these circumstances your committee feel confident that the court will see the necessity of this work being carried into execution with as little delay as possible.

During the summer months your committee held their monthly meetings as usual at Hanwell, and though it is found inconvenient to do so in the winter, they have individually gone there when perfectly unexpected, and have examined every part of the establishment, which they have uniformly found in the best order.

Your committee have directed, that for the future the treasurer's cash account shall be kept at the Bank of England, and the parishes are accordingly directed to pay the amount due from them, either there or at the office at the asylum.

Your committee feel it unnecessary to enter into any further detail: to explain the increase or diminution of any one article of expenditure, which may at first sight appear disproportionate, would extend the report to an inconvenient length. They feel confident that the result of their labours will give satisfaction to the county at large, and that the court will feel assured that both the welfare of the patients and the interest of the institution will still continue to meet with their most unremitting attention.

**THE FIFTH REPORT of the Resident Physician and Treasurer of the Middlesex Pauper Lunatic Asylum.**

THE additional room made for the patients during the year has been almost entirely filled up by old and incurable cases; only ten said to be of recent date having been admitted. The number of cures must therefore be expected to be proportionally small. A few, however, of many years standing have recovered, have been discharged, and continue well to the present time. This unexpected result is to be attributed entirely to a perseverance in moral remedies. By inducing the patient to exercise and combine the mental faculties which remain to him, these become strengthened, and others are gradually developed, until the mind is eventually restored to its original powers. It will be evident that, to carry this plan into execution, a great diversity of employment and amusement must be carefully selected and continued with unremitting attention for years, according to the different states and various habits and tastes of the patients. By keeping the attention completely engrossed, so as to allow the mind no time to dwell upon its prevailing delusions, these almost imperceptibly fade away, and, after a period vanish altogether. It will not be a matter of surprise, that many years are often requisite to eradicate erroneous notions which have existed in the minds for years undisturbed. The fact that restoration ever takes place under such apparently hopeless circumstances should be an encouragement to leave no means untried. A few of the old cases which have been discharged as cured have quickly relapsed, and have been again received into the asylum. Some of these relapses have arisen from dissolute habits, some from injudicious management, and others from poverty and distress pressing too heavily upon them, without any hope of relief. For the latter cases, a remedy has in some degree been provided by Her most gracious Majesty and a benevolent public in the formation of a fund, called Queen Adelaide's Fund, and which at present amounts to 1,148*l.*, the interest of which is to be applied to the relief of the destitute, when discharged cured.

To afford a remedy to the two former classes is a more difficult task, and can be expected only to take place in the first, through the influence of morality and religion operating upon the mind; and, in the second, through the guardians and overseers of the poor departing from their regular discipline, by providing the persons discharged with a temporary residence out of the work-house, where they will not be subject to the jeers and taunts of those around them, but have an opportunity of quietly creeping again into society under the aid and assistance of the parochial officers. A little extra allowance and a little kindness shown to one, under the painful feelings of fear and uncertainty which must ever accompany the coming out of seclusion, and the having again to contend with the world, would be amply repaid by the consciousness of the good that had been done, as well as, in all probability, by the saving effected in preserving him from relapse, which, in many cases, ends but with life. It may be gratifying to know, that the patient designated "A. B." in the last Report, who recovered in a few months after he was considered incurable, remains perfectly well.

The patients have, as usual, been remarkably healthy. During the present year, no epidemic of any description has existed, and the deaths have principally taken place from pure exhaustion.

In former years, from the very incorrect notions entertained of this disease, religious and moral instruction of any kind was never thought of being afforded to the insane. Happily a better knowledge and a better state of feeling now exist. And it is at this time generally admitted, that though on some points the mind may be insane, yet on others it may be perfectly rational. And it is no ordinary blessing to many of the sufferers, that a just sense of religion often remains, when every other feeling seems obliterated. An Act of Parliament now provides that the religious services, according to the Established Church, should be performed in all large asylums in this country. Here, the patients have the instruction of the Rev. J. Stoddart, the chaplain to the institution, and a more orderly and attentive congregation cannot be assembled together. Some of the committee and other gentlemen have frequently been present, and have expressed their astonishment and delight at witnessing the reverence and decorum of the patients.

It is much to be lamented that some prejudices still remain in the minds of many persons, very detrimental to this suffering class of our fellow-creatures, which much retards (if not entirely prevents) the cure of several of them. One of the worst is, that of totally excluding them from all rational society, until they can be proclaimed perfectly well. There is reason to believe, that if a proper degree of liberty be allowed, as the mind begins to open, and objects be presented to it with which it had been previously familiar and interested, many might at least be partially introduced into society, and enjoy much of happiness, who are now, in all ranks, doomed to incarceration for life. The occupation of the patients has been progressively increasing. During the year upwards of 360 have been constantly more or less employed, either in the house or in the grounds when the weather has been favourable; and, it is with thankfulness recorded again, without a single accident. The delight experienced in witnessing the benefit derived by this system is, in some measure, a compensation for the additional duties and danger which it necessarily entails. This delight, too, must, in some measure, be felt by those who have provided such ample means for carrying these plans into execution; and it cannot but be an additional gratification to the benevolent to witness also, in those who have been discharged from the asylum, the happiness diffused from the distribution of that fund which has been so generously raised to afford relief in the most trying moments of life.

what other disease liable, when discharged, cured or relieved, date of death, to which ward sent, to what parish belonging, and by whose order sent.

Also a book in which the accounts will be kept with the different parishes, which accounts are to be delivered and balanced every quarter.

Also a cash-book, in which all receipts and disbursements are to be regularly entered at the time of receipt or payment.

He will be required to attend such public meetings of the magistrates at the sessions as the visiting justices shall direct. He will never absent himself for more than a single night, without obtaining leave from the visiting magistrates.

He will find two sufficient persons to be bound for him for the due application of all sums of money which shall be entrusted to his care, in the sum of 1,000*l.* each, or four persons in the sum of 500*l.* each.

**The Matron.**—Will be responsible for the general domestic management of the institution, and moral treatment of the female patients.

She will see every ward and female patient at least once every day, and oftener, if occasion require, and visit the sick, either male or female, to see that they are properly nursed, and to inquire if they receive the extra allowances ordered for them.

She will particularly attend to the quality of all the provisions, to their being distributed in proper rations, and see that they are properly cooked, and that the greatest economy is practised in every department.

She will take care of, and be responsible for, all the stores, clothing, &c., &c., of the institution, and keep check-books of all clothing, bedding and furniture given to the keepers and servants in every department.

She will watch every opportunity for the employment of the females, and apportion their work according to their tastes and capabilities. She will be particularly careful that, in all their occupations, they are treated with the greatest kindness by the keepers and servants whom they are ordered to assist.

She will never absent herself for more than a single night, without having obtained leave from the visiting magistrates.

**Consulting Physician.**—There will be a consulting physician appointed, who will be sent for in cases of great difficulty and emergency, and whenever the committee of visiting magistrates think necessary, for which attendance he will be paid such sums as the committee of magistrates and he may agree upon.

**Consulting Surgeon.**—There will be a consulting surgeon appointed, who will be sent for when any difficult case or operation may be necessary, the house surgeon and apothecary performing all the minor operations.

**Chaplain.**—There will be a chaplain appointed, who will perform the service according to the ritual of the Church of England, and preach once every Sunday, and attend to afford religious instruction and consolation to any patient desirous of seeing him, if considered by the physician in such a state as will be likely to be benefited by it. He will administer the sacrament of the Lord's Supper every quarter to the household, and to any patients who may be in a fit state to receive it. He will receive a salary to be fixed by the visiting magistrates.

Patients not of the Established Church may be attended by the minister of their own religion, if the resident physician think them in a fit state; such attention being gratuitous.

**House Surgeon, Apothecary and Clerk.**—He will reside in the asylum, and not absent himself from it without the knowledge of the resident physician, as it is necessary that one of them should always be in attendance.

He will perform all the minor operations, make up the medicines, and keep the accounts of the institution, in the way approved of by the visiting magistrates.

He will visit every ward and patient every day; be careful to watch over the keepers, properly administering all medicine, wine and beer, which may be ordered for them from time to time; and see that the patients are always treated with the greatest humanity and kindness.

He will also examine the state of the beds, blankets, linen, &c., and once a week go round the male wards with the shoemaker to examine the shoes, who will then give out such as are necessary, at the same time collecting those that want repairing. He will report if any infringement of the rules given by the director and matron be attempted.

**Housekeeper.**—She will watch over the inferior servants, and see that all the rules and regulations given by the matron be carried into execution, and, upon any breach of them, is expected to report the same.

She will superintend the weighing of the meat when delivered by the butchers, the groceries and other articles, and sign the check-book if correct; also the weighing out the meat, bread, &c., for the daily consumption of the whole establishment, according to the diet table; and the soap, starch, &c., for the use of the wash-house and laundry, and the weekly allowance of groceries, butter, &c., apportioned for each keeper and servant, with the allowances directed for any of the patients. She will superintend the management of the kitchen and dairy; and see that all the provisions are properly cooked, and delivered to each keeper, according to the number of patients in each ward.

She will, every day, visit all the female wards, and, under the direction of the matron, inspect the bedding and linen, cut out the female clothing, and deliver the work to the female keepers. She will go round with the shoemaker once a week to inspect all the shoes belonging to the female patients, who will then give out such as are necessary, at the same time collecting those that want repairing.

She will keep the keys of the larder, dairy, bread-room, and other stores committed to her charge.

She will never absent herself from the institution without the knowledge and leave of the matron, with whom she will always leave the keys when she is absent.

**Patients.**—Will be admitted every Tuesday and Friday, from 11 to 1 o'clock. The overseer of the parish must first write to inquire if there be a vacancy. He will then receive a list of questions,

which must be answered immediately, and as correctly as possible. He will then be informed if the patient can be admitted, and on what day.

The patients will be clothed in the dress of the institution, their own clothes being sent back to the overseers, and brought again for them when they are discharged.

The friends of the patients will be permitted to see them on Tuesdays and Fridays, between 11 and 1 o'clock, unless any particular circumstance exist which renders such visit injurious to the patients. And it must be observed that in the early stages of the disease visits from friends and relatives are usually detrimental, and often much retard the cure.

No money on any account is to be given to patients, or left with any officer, keeper or servant for them. Nor is anything in the way of provisions, sweatmeats, oranges or fruit of any kind to be given to a patient without the knowledge of the keeper or the person in attendance. Nor is any present or gratuity to be given to any officer or servant in the establishment. This clause to be painted, and hung up in the admission-rooms of both male and female patients.

When the friends of the patients visit them, they shall not be prevented from holding private conversation with them, so that an opportunity may be afforded to the patients to make complaints to them if they choose. But no male shall be left alone with a female patient, unless he be her father, husband, brother or son; and no female shall be left alone with a male, unless she be his mother, wife, sister or daughter.

The overseer of the poor shall be admitted to see any patient belonging to his parish whenever he thinks proper, on the Tuesday and Friday, between 11 and 1 o'clock; but no person or persons, after patients are admitted into the asylum, will be allowed to inspect the premises, unless introduced and accompanied by a magistrate of the county.

The weekly charge for each patient to the respective parishes will be fixed according to the Act of Parliament by the visiting magistrates from time to time.

Provisions, Coals, &c.—Coals, straw and provisions of every description, will be supplied by contract made for each article for three months at a time. The meat to be contracted for by the carcass—ox beef and wether mutton. On the delivery of every article at the asylum, it will be weighed in the presence of the officer appointed, and the book in which such article is entered will be signed by the officer, or it will not be allowed for in the account. Check-books are to be kept with every tradesman, and every article used is to be kept amongst the accounts, and be forthcoming for the inspection of the visiting magistrates whenever they think proper.

Any fruit, vegetable or other article produced in the garden or grounds of the asylum, which is not wanted in the house, shall be sold for the benefit of the institution, agreeably to the order of the director, and the amount entered in the cash-book.

The clothing will also be supplied by contract, if not manufactured in the asylum.

#### DIET TABLE.

*Breakfast and Supper.*—Made in the following manner: Milk, one gallon; water, two gallons; oatmeal, two pounds and three-quarters; wheat flour, one quarter of a pound; a pint of which, with a proper proportion of the daily allowance of bread, is to be given to each patient.

*Dinner.*—Yeast dumplings with treacle sauce, and roast beef, on Sundays; and boiled beef or mutton, with vegetables, on Tuesdays and Thursdays; six ounces of meat, free from bone, allowed for each patient.

Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays: Soup made from the meat boiled the day before. Saturday: Stew made from the coarse meat, mixed with rice.

Bread, weighing 15 ounces, will be ordered for each person in the family for every day; of peas, oatmeal, pepper, salt, as much will be used as necessary.

Patients will breakfast at eight, dine at one, and sup at seven.

Any alteration in the diet for the sick, with the addition of beer, wine, &c. will be ordered as their cases may require.

*Funerals.*—When any patients die, a letter shall be immediately written to the overseers of the parish to whom they belong, and also to their relations or friends, if it be their wish, and they have previously given their address, which shall always be kept in a book provided for that purpose.

The body is always to be given to the relations, if it is their request; if not, to be buried in the nearest burial-ground on the fourth day after death. The expense of the funeral, not exceeding such a sum as shall be fixed by the visiting magistrates, is to be charged to the respective parishes.

*Committee Meetings.*—The visiting magistrates will meet at the asylum every quarter to make the contracts, and at such other times as they shall think necessary to inspect the patients and the whole of the establishment.

The tenders shall all be sealed and addressed to "The Visiting Magistrates of the Lunatic Asylum for the County of Middlesex," and be delivered on the morning of the meeting, of which due notice shall be given in the papers, or in any way agreeably to their orders from time to time.

#### RULES and REGULATIONS for the Keepers and Servants.—To be printed, and hung up in each Keeper's and Servant's Room.

First, Every patient on admission is to be stripped and washed, and it is to be carefully observed if there be any swelling in any part of the body, vermin, or spots on the skin; the hair is to be cut close and combed, and the patient is then to be clothed in the asylum dress.

Second, Every keeper and servant is expected to rise at six o'clock; the keepers will then immediately wash and comb their patients, and observe if there be any soreness or discolouration of the skin in any part of the body. They are expected also to examine the stools and urine of the patients, so as to be able to report their state, and every other particular concerning them. On any patient appearing ill, information is immediately to be taken of it to the apothecary's shop. They must also pay the strictest attention to the administering the medicines, &c. agreeably to the directions.

Third, When the bell rings for prayers they will attend with such patients as are in a proper state. At eight o'clock the patients will breakfast; as soon as breakfast is over the keepers will clean out the galleries and bed-rooms, lay the beds and bedding to air, and remove the wet straw and every kind of dirt or dirty linen, and in fine weather open the windows. It must be understood, that no place will be considered clean which can be made cleaner.

Fourth,

Fourth, The patients will dine at one o'clock and sup at seven. They will go to bed as soon as supper is over, and no clothing is to be allowed to remain in the room. One hour before every meal the keepers will take down their trays and tins to the kitchens, and at the same time take from the apothecary's shop the medicines ordered for their patients; and when the bell rings (but not before) the keepers, with a patient to assist them, will go to their respective kitchens for the provisions. After each meal, the dishes, trenchers, kits, &c. are to be carefully washed, and every knife, fork and spoon is to be counted and locked up. The male keepers will shave their patients on Wednesdays and Saturdays.

Fifth, The keepers will not be permitted to leave their ward except at the time appointed above, unless some very urgent business demand it, when he or she will inform the keeper in the next ward of the cause of their absence; but they must, at no time whatever, leave their wards without having first locked up in their rooms any patients who are liable to be violent, or strike another, excepting such patient is properly secured. Any male keeper wanting anything from the housekeeper or kitchen, must apply in the office. No patient to be allowed either to deliver out the meat, beer, bread or pottage to the patients. No patient to be permitted to leave the wards in the morning before breakfast to assist the house-servants, without the servants personally fetching them. No patient to be allowed to fetch either medicine, wine or beer from the apothecary's shop.

Sixth, The keepers are to be accountable for all bed and other linen, the patients' clothing, and the various articles belonging to the wards.

Seventh, Any keeper striking or ill-treating a patient will, for the first offence, be fined 5 s., and be dismissed for the second; nor are the keepers to use any harsh or intemperate language, which tends to irritate or disturb them, as their duty is uniformly to be discharged in a mild humane manner. They are at all times to appear clean and tidy in their persons, and strictly decorous in their behaviour.

Eighth, Any keeper found making a perquisite of any kind, or selling anything to a patient, will be fined 5 s. for the first offence, and dismissed for the second. Any servant, from whose custody a patient escapes, through negligence, shall pay such proportion of the expense of retaking the patient, as the magistrates at their next meeting shall order.

Ninth, On Saturday, at eight o'clock in the morning, every keeper is expected to deliver a list, in writing, of the household utensils wanted in his or her ward for the following week, which will be delivered on the Monday morning. If at any time a knife, instrument or tool, such as a brush, fire-irons, &c. shall be left unlocked up after using, or the door of the fire-guards left unlocked, each keeper shall forfeit 1 s. Any keeper leaving his or her ward or airing-court without giving notice to the keeper in the next ward where he or she is gone, shall forfeit 1 s.; and any keeper permitting a patient to get up and go about the ward or house before he or she is up to take charge of, or deliver the patient to the care of others, shall forfeit 1 s.

As to permanent Cures in each Year.—This is a question which, from the nature of the malady, it is impossible to answer ; but, from the books, it appears that the number of discharges in the last five years has been 127, of which only 49 have been re-admitted.

The assigned Cause of each Death.—Principally old age, dropsy, apoplexy and epilepsy, with some cases of consumption. In many instances patients are sent to the asylum in a very old and infirm, and sometimes almost dying state.

#### DIETARY.

Monday.—*Breakfast*, milk broth with bread, or bread, cheese or butter, with tea or beer. *Dinner*, suet puddings or dumplings. *Supper*, bread, cheese or butter, and tea or beer.

Tuesday.—*Breakfast*, as on Monday. *Dinner*, beef or mutton, bread, potatoes and beer ; one pint to the men, and half a pint to women. *Supper*, meat broth, or bread, cheese or butter, with tea or beer.

Wednesday.—*Breakfast*, as before. *Dinner*, rice, or suet puddings, or dumplings, and beer. *Supper*, as on Monday.

Thursday.—*Breakfast*, as before. *Dinner*, as on Tuesday. *Supper*, as on Tuesday.

Friday.—*Breakfast*, as before. *Dinner*, suet puddings or dumplings, and beer. *Supper*, as on Monday.

Saturday.—*Breakfast*, as before. *Dinner*, as on Wednesday. *Supper*, as on Monday.

Sunday.—*Breakfast*, as before, *Dinner*, as on Tuesday. *Supper*, as on Tuesday.

The patients average, per week, per head, about 5  $\frac{1}{2}$  lbs. of bread, 4 lbs. of pudding or dumpling, with treacle, of which about 28 lbs. are used, 1  $\frac{1}{2}$  lb. of meat,  $\frac{1}{2}$  lb. of cheese or butter, about 7 lbs. of potatoes, 1  $\frac{1}{2}$  pint of beer for the men per day, 1 pint for the women, and tea ; and those who take milk-broth in the morning, have about 1  $\frac{1}{2}$  pint, and those who take tea,  $\frac{1}{2}$  pint. When patients are unwell, the physician directs their diet, wine, porter, gruel, &c., as he thinks proper.

As to modes of Occupation.—There are none particularly ; but when convalescent, the female patients are employed in cleaning and washing, and the male patients in assisting the porters on the premises, in gardening, &c.

Medical Officers.—One physician and a surgeon, who make their visits two or three times a week, and oftener if required, and deliver in a monthly report to the visiting justices.

Keepers.—There are three male assistants and three female assistants, besides the master and matron.

Infirmary.—There is a separate infirmary for males and females, with yards for them to walk about in, which there has never, during the 22 years the asylum has been opened, been any occasion to use.

Weekly Charge.—The weekly charge for each pauper patient, from Lady-day 1830 to Christmas 1835, has varied from 6 s. to 4 s. 6 d., at which latter sum it was fixed for two quarters in 1835 ; it is now 4 s. 9 d., in which charge is included the salaries and wages of the master, matron, physician, surgeon, clerk and every other officer or servant of the establishment, and every other charge except the repairs of the building which are paid by the county.

Boarder Patients.—During the last six years there have been admitted none other than pauper patients belonging to the county of Norfolk, except four males from the borough of Lynn, which does not pay to the county rates, who were admitted into the asylum on the 28th of March 1836, as boarders, at the weekly sum of 7 s. 6 d. each.

Dietary for Paupers.—*Breakfast* every day, milk-porridge, made as follows: Oatmeal, 4 lbs.; milk, 6 gallons; water, 11 gallons; of which the males have, daily, porridge, 1 ½ pint; bread, 8 ounces. Females, porridge, 1 pint; bread, 6 ounces.

*Dinner*.—Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, soup made as follows: Leg of beef, 30 lbs.; water, 16 gallons; peas, 6 quarts; flour, 3 lbs., seasoned with pot-herbs, pepper and salt; of which the males have, daily, soup, 1 ½ pint; bread, 8 ounces; beer, 1 pint. Females, daily; soup, 1 pint; bread, 6 ounces; beer, ¾ pint.

Sundays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays:—Males; boiled or roasted meat, without waste, 6 ounces; suet pudding or bread, 8 ounces; potatoes, 10 ounces; other vegetables occasionally; beer, 1 pint. Females; boiled or roasted meat, without waste, 5 ounces; suet pudding, or bread, 6 ounces; potatoes, 6 ounces; other vegetables occasionally; beer, ¾ pint.

*Supper* every night:—Males; cheese, 2 ounces; bread, 6 ounces; beer, 1 pint. Females; bread and butter, 5 ounces; tea, ¾ pint.

Wine, ale and other comforts are given to the patients, when ordered medicinally.

Those patients who work, or in any way make themselves useful, have a small portion of bread and cheese, and half a pint of ale at 11 o'clock. Tobacco and snuff, in small quantities, is allowed as an indulgence to those who conduct themselves well, and used them before they became insane.

The amusements are music, cards, draughts, chess, backgammon, bowls, books, periodicals, newspapers, &c.

The occupations of the males are domestic employment, such as cleaning the wards and different exercising-grounds and passages; cleaning knives, forks, shoes, &c.; gardening on a large scale, mowing, planting, and all the incidental work attendant on such occupations; in addition to these we have one tailor, one cabinet-maker, and two who assist the brewer.

The females are employed in the same way as the males, in cleaning the galleries, &c. They also make and mend the whole of the linen of the house, and their own wearing apparel, and such of the men's clothing as is usually done by females; they also assist in the kitchen, the laundry, and every other household occupation.

On the 30th June last there were in the house 103 patients, of which number 68 are regularly occupied, and many others at intervals during the remission of their paroxysm.

The medical officers, one a physician, consulting surgeon, and a resident surgeon, who is the director.

There are five regular male, and five female keepers; but there are a joiner, bricklayer and gardener attached to the establishment, who do the repairs of the house, superintend and control the male patients when employed away from their wards.

There is not at present an infirmary, but the want of one has been long felt; and it is now in contemplation to have one to supply the deficiency.

The weekly charge for the maintenance of paupers, is 8 s., and the clothing amounts, on an average, to 1 s. 6 d. per week, in addition.

There are two other classes of patients, who pay for their maintenance such sums as their pecuniary means will afford; and such as are unable to pay as much as will indemnify the institution, and are not paupers, are assisted by a charitable fund formed by voluntary contributions.

SUBSCRIPTION FUND.

THE Benefaction and Subscription Fund was instituted before the opening of the establishment in 1818, and has been in constant and beneficial operation since that period; the committee having been enabled to admit on it up to the present time no less than 156 cases on the recommendation of benefactors and subscribers to the fund, and to have constantly on it between 20 and 30 patients, at an annual expense amounting, for the past year, to the sum of 334 *l.* 17 *s.*

This fund is expressly designed for the relief of individuals resident in the county, whose friends, not receiving any parochial relief, are unable to defray the whole of the weekly charge made by the establishment for the admission, care and maintenance of private patients.

The patients admitted on it are divided into two classes, the Upper and Lower: the upper class, consisting of individuals who have moved in good circumstances, are associated with the higher classes of patients in the house; and the deficit arising from the payments agreed to be paid by their friends on their admission, is made up out of the fund to 16*s.* per week. The lower class of patients admitted on this fund consists of individuals who have moved in the more humble walks of life, and are associated with the lower classes in the house; and the deficit, arising from the payments agreed to be paid by their friends on their admission, is made up out of the fund to 12 *s.* per week.

The fund is kept perfectly distinct from the other cash accounts of the establishment, and is in no other manner brought into use for its disbursements, except by orders made quarterly, and signed by the committee, for the transfer of so much of it to the general cash account as will make up the deficits on every case during the past quarter.

The moderate reimbursements to the institution for the support of these patients, which have been thus adopted, in order to allow of the greatest possible extension of this charity, consistently with its funds, must be obvious. The committee can state, that the patients on whom it has been bestowed, have truly required the benevolent aid of the subscribers, whether as regards the patients themselves, who could not have been admitted into or continued in the asylum, without this aid; or as regards the pecuniary resources of their friends; and they beg to add, that the circumstances of each individual case have always undergone their most attentive consideration previously to the relief required from the fund being granted.

*Breakfasts and Suppers.*—Milk, one gallon; water, two gallons; oatmeal, 2  $\frac{1}{2}$  pounds; wheat flour, one quarter of a pound. Each patient allowed 1  $\frac{1}{2}$  pint.

*Dinners.*—Yeast dumplings with treacle-sauce, and boiled beef or mutton with vegetables, on Sundays, Tuesdays and Thursdays. Six ounces of meat, free from bone, allowed for each patient.—Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays: soup, made from the meat boiled the day before; each patient allowed 1  $\frac{1}{2}$  pint. Saturdays: rice currie, quarter of a pound of rice to each patient. Twelve ounces of bread per day for each patient.

Those patients who are employed in the several occupations of the establishment are allowed luncheons morning and afternoon, four ounces of bread and three quarters of a pint of beer each.

The expense incurred by the Burgh in maintaining the Gaol for each of the above years, independently of the aliment of convicted prisoners, is about 50 *l.* per annum.

DINGWALL.

IN the month of September 1830, the Gaol of this Burgh was declared by the Circuit Court of Justiciary unfit to be used any longer as a place of confinement; from which time, until the month of October last, (when, having been repaired, it was again legalized by the High Court of Justiciary) no Prisoner was committed within the Gaol of this Burgh. It also appears from the accounts of the Burgh, that no aliment was paid during the period from the 31st December 1829 till the condemnation of the Gaol in September 1830.

The Prisoners from the Burgh of Dingwall, and the Western District of Ross-shire, who would most probably have been confined in the Gaol of Dingwall, were, after its condemnation, committed to the prisons of the Burghs of Tain and Fortrose; and the Magistrates of these Burghs have brought claims against the Magistrates of Dingwall for the period for which the Return is required, conform to the Schedule hereunto annexed.


